The Music Department follows the SEND policy for the whole school which can be found <a href="here">here</a>. However, we assess the individual needs of students within our department and adjust these access supports as necessary to allow all students equitable access to our Music Curriculum.

#### Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

We offer peripatetic lessons in the following instruments: piano, brass, voice, drums, bass/electric and acoustic guitar. These are one to one for ½ hour every 2 weeks.

Students can use the practice rooms every break/lunchtime to rehearse as individuals or as an ensemble. Students regularly play in rock bands or practice their KS4 exam pieces or other songs during this time. Students can hire instruments through Essex Music Services, but also have access to our drum kits, guitars, pianos and microphones during break and lunch time.

Students make progress through opportunities to perform in the local community, such as carnival, school shows, performances to the Rotary club and are taking part in a local festival competition this year for young musician of the year.

To support the GCSE student's performance exam, they also put on a concert for local parents/carers.

As a school we put on a whole school musical yearly, which gives students the opportunity to perform and develop skills in the other Performing Arts disciplines also. Students who have an interest in music technology also help at all of our events, developing skills in setting up sound.

Students pay for peripatetic lessons but are subsidised if they are Pupil Premium.

All clubs run in school are free and open to all year groups.

We work with local businesses, charities and our feeder primary schools to support cocurricular music. This included workshops run by our staff along with performances at events in the local community.

As a department, to support staff wellbeing, we also run a staff choir. We have end of term assemblies in which staff and students perform.

# **Part C: Musical experiences**

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

September yearly – Carnival. Our students performed at our local carnival. This carnival raises money for charity. Next year we will be doing a carnival float and having students perform on this.

December yearly – Whole School musical. Students auditioned in Summer Term and a regular rehearsal schedule is set out. Some rehearsals took part in October half term.

Tickets are open to the public and local community and priced at £7 per adult and £5 per student. Staff are allowed 1 free ticket. Students in all year groups are participating.

Trips – Music Technology students visit and complete a workshop at Abbey Road Studios. All students had the opportunity to see the Musical Six at The Cliff's Pavilion. PP students are always offered these tickets for free.

January 2025 – Year 11 Music Performance to parents/carers as a mock exam. This will be filmed, and we have an external moderator coming in to support us from another secondary school.

February 2025– Civic Performance. These are awards given to the local community. Our students perform in a formal setting for this event, either singing or instrumental.

April 2025 – music festival in Southminster for all schools in the Dengie. This is a competition for musician of the year and has a monetary prize.

#### In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

We are continuing to develop the KS4 Trinity course, encouraging students to play a range of instruments to a grade 6 standard. We are also going to have our own carnival float next year to give more students opportunity to perform to an audience, along with more competitions such as the music festival. We want to also work with the Rotary club to put on a charity event after Christmas. I would also like to have a live band for our next musical as opposed to backing tracks, as some of our students could perform in this.
